President's Column

Dear Members,

Although it is now nearly two months since the devastating earthquake in Christchurch there are still news reports and articles about its aftermath that make it the focus of many people's attention. Many communities have rallied around to assist and help with fund raising, not the least of which is the arts and cultural communities with many fund raising events being organised around the country, one example being Stagecraft Theatre in Wellington giving one performance of their current production as a fund raiser for theatres in Christchurch. Great work Stagecraft.

On a brighter note it is very pleasing to report the success of our Special General meeting held in early April where the revised and updated Constitution was approved. The biggest and most significant change was to the governance structure of the Federation to take place from this year's Annual General Meeting. The Officers and Executive of the Federation are now elected representatives from members of the Federation. This means that all theatre groups and societies around the country who are members of the Federation have the opportunity to both nominate someone and to then vote those nominated onto the National Executive. Nomination forms are included with this newsletter so it is hoped that all members will give this serious consideration at their next committee meeting and that we will receive nominations of a diverse collection of people from around the country for the National Executive.

As well as considering the governance of NZTF it is also hoped that members are seriously thinking about this year's Festival of Community Theatre within their region. The closing date for entries at local level is 31 May and entry forms are available on the Federation's web site. It is very pleasing to note the possibility of a Festival in Whakatane this year to cater for not only the Bay of Plenty region but also from across the Waikato. The Festival is a great way of bringing theatre groups within a region together and it is hoped that the re-emergence of a Festival in the BOP region will be a stimulus for such Festivals in other areas in the future. It is also very gratifying to know that Canterbury/Westcoast are considering a Festival in Christchurch. The Regional Festival that was to take place in Christchurch has understandably been moved to Nelson. Planning for the other Regional Festivals and for the National

Final in Nelson is well under way but more on that in the next newsletter.

So till then wishing all theatre groups the very best as we move into winter, a time that is often seen as the height of activity in a theatre groups calendar.



- Aranui High School: Our heartfelt sympathy goes to Robert Gilbert HOD Drama whose son Jamie was killed in the earthquake. Robert advises that his production of Hamlet for Canterbury Repertory Theatre is going ahead in the Aurora Centre May 5 - 7.
- Christ's College's English block has been demolished and replaced with temporary classrooms.
- Elmwood Players: their venue stood firm and their • AGM has been rescheduled to May 1st. The workshops for directors and actors have been postponed.
- St Bedes College have postponed their Centennial celebrations and opened their campus to a sister school to use in the afternoons.
- Top Dog Theatre's Derek Doddington writes that they • were very fortunate to complete a wonderful sunny run of Open Air Summer Shakespeare's Taming of the Shrew just 2 days before the quake. Their thoughts are with everyone in Christchurch especially now that theatrical forces need to be joined to rebuild theatre venues. THE PERFUMED GARDEN

Dean Parker (2w 3m)

Cain was buried there. The ancient Greeks came there. The British marched in there, in triumph. The hippies came, from the ends of the earth. Then the Russians came. And finally the New Zealanders. Afghanistan, that stony hell-hole, that perfumed garden.

THE DAYLIGHT ATHEIST

Tom Scott (1m)

From one of New Zealand's most respected writers and satirists, this is a funny, fierce and profoundly moving oneman play invoking the colourful past and extraordinary cast of one man's lifetime. From Irish boyhood to World War II airman to New Zealand immigrant, he retraces a life of profane exploits and irreverent adventures.

SUITE SIXTEEN

Jon Gadsby & David McPhail (4m 2w – up to 20 characters) An hilarious comedy – with a hint of black drama – from the well known comic duo. Seven separate plays set in a single accident-prone motel room with a manager who is a cross between Reginald Perrin, Basil Fawlty and an East German spy.

BAGHDAD, BABY!

Dean Parker (2w 4m)

An exotic tragi-comic epic with romantic overtones, this is a perfect balance of humour, politics, broken hearts and outrage. However, this is primarily a play about people, our common humanity; how, when faced with violence and our need for love and security, we all want the same fundamental things.

BEAUTIFUL LOSERS

Mike Hudson (2m)

In their pursuit of the ultimate high, writer Jack Kerouac ('On the Road') and con artist/car thief Neal Cassady leave New York for Mexico, accompanied by a soundtrack of cool Jazz, conversation, drugs and booze. A comedy/drama about their crazed and inspired relationship and the birth of the Beat Generation.

CENTRAL OTAGO MAN

Justin Eade (4w 5m)

The ravages of political correctness have left Tryfen Gribilco entirely untouched in his native Otago environment and he has successfully managed to remain completely unreconstructed. However his encounters with a range of worldly wise travellers challenge him to take a journey of discovery.

CUTS BOTH WAYS

Peter Griffin (1w 4m)

When Sarah walks into Monte's jaded "gents-only" barbershop looking for a number 2 buzz-cut, it becomes ground zero in a battle of the sexes, of youth versus wisdom, of the old versus the new. No one is left unscathed in this cutting social commentary inspired by true events.

SELF DEFENCE

Denis Edwards (1w 1m)

This bittersweet play follows the ebb and flow of power in a relationship. It is set in a downmarket boxing gym, where the only make up in the place is the Vasoline on the boxer's eyebrows. One morning Sally arrives wanting to learn boxing for self defence. Something is wrong - she doesn't look right for this place - it's also clear she has an agenda of her own.

THE WIFE WHO SPOKE JAPANESE IN HER SLEEP Vivienne Plumb (3w 3m)

A housewife with ordinary quarter-acre dreams one night inexplicably begins speaking Japanese in her sleep. Immediately the wheels are set in motion for her transformation from suburban housewife into sleep-talking media megastar.

AUNT DAISY

Peter Hawes (7w 3m)

NZ during the birth of broadcasting 1910 to 1960. A wildly uplifting musical about a woman who became a legend in her own lifetime. This Downstage commissioned play, with music composed by the Six Volts, was a premiere hit. Larger chorus possible.

WHEELER'S LUCK

Nigel Collins, Toby Leach, Damon Andrews (2m – 50+characters)

Local landowner Nora Cox dies, leaving her prime costal property to the people of the small town of Bell End. This gift leads to a profusion of hilarious tensions and rivalries as the colourful townspeople battle over how to best handle her gift.

FLAGONS AND FOXTROTS

Alison Quigan & Ross Gumbley (4m 3w)

Newbury Hall, 5kms out of Palmy, 1965 is the setting for the Jenkins family story and a lot more. A glimpse of life before pubs, techno and dance raves – a very popular romantic comedy.

GREAT EXPECTATIONS

Dean Parker (6+w 6+m up to 20 cast) An adaptation of the Charles Dickens classic.

KNOT A PROBLEM


Malcolm Murray (1m)

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Workshops after the SGM


Dave and I both had a fabulous time attending the workshops offered after the recent SGM.

D'Arcy Smith, from Toi Whakaari the New Zealand Drama School, ran a connecting text workshop that covered aspects of delivering lines to the audience to convey meaning and develop characterization. Through poetry and Shakespeare we looked at word meanings and linking physical actions to them. The concept of runs and tension were played with and practical techniques for developing tension on stage were practised.

Directing 101 offered practical advice to budding

directors. Ewen Coleman, NZ Theatre Federation's president, took participants through script analysis and how to structure rehearsals. By breaking scripts up into manageable units actors can develop a sense of the different energy levels in the play. This is a powerful way for directors to get the most out of actors. Participants also looked at how to choose plays and research them to develop performances to the intention of the author.

Both courses added to our current knowledge and created contacts in the Theatre Federation organization and we strongly advise anyone interested in theatre to attend future workshops.
