It's pleasing to see groups embrace these ideals.

The National Final in Hastings, organised by the Hawke's Bay Festival Theatre Committee, was a wonderful culmination of this year's Festivals and deemed by everyone attending a great success. The six presentations, the range of subject matter and styles of presentations were as diverse as in any National Final seen previously and the standard this year was exceptionally high.

Congratulations to all 6 teams, whether or not you came away with an award, and especially to those who travelled from the South Island. The requirements of travelling to Festivals is becoming a big hurdle and is a major factor for many groups on whether or not to enter the Festival. Although we had a generous grant from the Drama Development Trust this year to assist teams to travel, the National Executive is mindful that further work is needed on looking at ways to assist groups travelling to Festivals.

We were also fortunate this year to have an overseas adjudicator, Larry McCluskey, whose erudite and knowledgeable adjudications impressed everyone. Both participants and audiences went away in awe at his ability to sum up a production so quickly and succinctly.

His masterclasses never eventuated because of lack of numbers, but he held open forums on Irish Theatre in Christchurch and Wellington which were again most enlightening to all those who attended.

And so as the end of the year looms large many groups are involved in their end of year productions and planning for next year, boding well for the future of NZ recreational theatre.

A Profile



NZTF President Ewen Coleman

Theatre has always been a passion of Ewen's, right from when he was a young child growing up in Taranaki taking speech and drama lessons from Nan Russell.

Ewen arrived in Wellington

in the mid 70s after working overseas and soon became involved with local theatre groups Wellington Repertory Theatre, Stagecraft and New Theatre. He has remained actively involved with both Stagecraft and Wellington Repertory Theatre, having served two terms as President for the latter as well as Secretary for the past 12 years.

Having worked both on stage and back stage for some time he decided his theatre "niche" was directing and so with the support of a number of experienced theatre practitioners and theatre groups he was given many opportunities to direct. Over 80 productions later, Ewen is a well established theatre director, not only in Wellington city but around the Wellington region.

His directing experience has also put him in good stead as an adjudicator since accreditation in the mid 1980's. He has adjudicated at all levels of the Festival of Community Theatre as well as numerous other Festivals both in NZ and overseas.

Theatre administration has always been a big part of his life not only with local groups but with Wellington District Theatre Federation for most of his time in Wellington and New Zealand Theatre Federation, currently serving his second term as President.

Through his involvement with theatre he has been associated with numerous other arts organisations such as Community Arts Councils, NZ Arts Assembly and Arts Participation Aotearoa Trust, all of which have made the "arts" a major part of Ewen's working life.



News from Timaru

The South Canterbury Drama League was this year nominated for the Art and Culture category of the Trustpower Community Awards. Awards are held in 25 regions around New Zealand to recognise and reward the outstanding contribution voluntary groups and organisations make to their communities. The League won its section and also the overall award in their region.

As all involved in amateur drama know countless hours of volunteer work are expended on productions and in keeping theatre groups running. As part of the response to the nomination Kevin Foley said they were asked to give the number of volunteer hours each month and each year that are worked in the league

- "An almost impossible task!" he said. "Perhaps unique for New Zealand, the South Canterbury Drama League encompasses five sections or committees that stage eight productions a year. We produce four plays in our Playhouse theatre, two in the "Mill Theatre" our theatre restaurant and hold "big" productions by the Musical Theatre and Juniors Committees in Timaru's Theatre Royal. The best guess number of hours was probably an underestimate in the application for the Awards and the application did mention the "social capital" that amateur drama groups contribute to the overall well being of a community. "

One group mounting eight productions a year in a place the size of Timaru (pop 28,000) is absolutely phenomenal. As a regional winner the South Canterbury Drama League now goes forward to the national awards to be held in March next year. We wish them every success.


Waihi Drama Society and Nana's Naughty Knickers
