

# TheatreFest, a perspective



As 2018 draws to a close it marks the 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of my involvement with Theatre New Zealand

and TheatreFest. While I have been involved in various capacities, perhaps the most significant has been as an educator and Performing Arts teacher. It was back in 2008 I was first made aware of Theatre New-Zealand and the annual TheatreFest competition. Determined to give it a go and see just what it was all about, I gathered two ex-students who had just recently left high school and pieced together a 45minute extract from Martin Sherman's play Bent to enter TheatreFest. As we progressed through the various levels of competition through to Nationals I was struck by just how educative, and meaningful the whole exercise was, for both my students and I as an educator. Until this point I had not encountered theatre competitions that provided such rich learning opportunities, feedback and guidance, developing participants far beyond just the competition. All to say, I was hooked and have subsequently entered numerous times with students from the three different high schools I have worked at since. TheatreFest has provided a wonderful platform for my students to write original works, direct and perform them, for a purpose other than just meeting assessment requirements as dictated by NZOA. Drama class, and the work done in it, becomes 'real', students developing their thinking, creativity and analytical skills alongside their theatrical abilities.

The learning that takes place is far richer than when just developing works for Drama class as their works are critiqued and developed by different voices other than my own. TheatreFest has provided a platform for my students to take a risk, especially in writing and directing, many of them never having done so before, and has been instrumental in students recognising these abilities they possess. To see one's original work presented on stage in front of an audience is an opportunity I wish existed when I was at school, an opportunity that has shown my students they have what it takes and could pursue this further. But it has not just been the students who have greatly benefited, I too have developed significantly in my directing and teaching ability through being introduced and exposed to the wisdom and experience of ANZDA adjudicators: seasoned practitioners generous enough to share what they

As preparation begins now for next year TheatreFest is firmly in my mind and my teaching programme and assessments will be designed around it, allowing for a different bunch of students to have this rich experience. What this will specifically look like, I am not sure yet, and perhaps this is the most exciting part as it shall be based around the needs of the students, their thoughts, vision and creative ideas, merged together in a performance to be ready for TheatreFest 2019.

3<sup>rd</sup> A Star is Born by Richard Prevett Comment: A satire mocking today's political environment. Dialogue is snappy and differentiates the characters effectively. The humour was nicely balanced within the absurd yarn. Businessman Humphrey has decided he'd like to be prime minister so engages a team of experts to advise him on image and strategy.

This was a double bill production with two completely different casts of 20 and crews sharing the same theatre - sometimes with only about an hour and half between the curtain coming down on one show and going up on the other. Logistical challenges of sharing rehearsal and technical time in the theatre and then sharing the wardrobe space were overcome through the committed and very organised people making it all work.

The most exciting thing about the project was the number of people involved. It was a successful collaboration between the two non-profit theatre groups based in Wellington City, and the end result says a lot about the very healthy state of both societies, and theatre in Wellington.

#### Comedy

#### MATTHEW, MARK, LUKE AND JOANNE

by Carl Nixon. 1w, 2m.

Matthew has a spiritual experience in the organic and gluten free aisle of his local supermarket. This profound change cannot be accepted by his wife, nor his best friend and business partner.

#### A LOVE LIKE OURS by Joe Musaphia.

3f, 2m. This play may be set at a funeral however the audience will be laughing rather than crying at the hilarious revelations that unfold coffinside from the lovers and beloved of the deceased

#### Drama

**DEAR JANE** by Nataliya Oryshchuk. 1f, 2m. A 40-minute play set in nineteenth century Christchurch. Jane Deans reflects back on her life forged by her marriage and her immigration to New Zealand from Scotland. This play is both emotionally and historically rich.

**MACBETH** by Dean Parker. 4f, 1m. Dean Parker's stripped-down version of The Scottish Play has all the action and terror of the original but can be staged by a small cast.

**CHERISH** by Ken Duncam. 2f, 2m. Maeve and Jess are blessed with two daughters thanks to the help and good wishes of their gay friend Tom. But when Jess becomes pregnant again so that she can return the favour to Tom and his partner William, Jess finds she can't bring herself to give the new babe away. This touching play explores the sensitivities and complexities of love, loss and relationships.

HOPE by Jenny Pattrick. 2f, 2m. Set in the future in a time when the health system is pushed to its limits, Irina, an ailing piano teacher is frustrated with a new government policy that does not allow her access to drugs that could save her life. At the same time, her former student, Adam is trying to end his life. Irina's son and daughter become involved not only in their mother's struggles but also Adam's in this tense drama.

LONG AGO, LONG AGO by Cassandra Tse. 2f, 1m. When Audrey's flat is damaged in a storm, she is forced to move in with her sister Ella. With scenes from the present day intermingled with scenes from the past, this play is a poetic meditation on grief and siblinghood.

#### Great for young adult performers

**DRACULA** by Claire Ahuriri-Dunning

5w, 7m, 3 any gender. This is a play for teenage actors to sink their teeth into. A group of actors encounters the text of Bram Stoker's Dracula and with campy, amateurish fervor start to enact the tales from within it. This historical piece is accompanied by singing from a chorus of the three emancipated brides of Dracula.

#### Plays with environmental themes

**SWING AMONG THE STARS** by Philip Braithwaite. 1m, 1f. This very short play is set in the future when human habitation on alternative planets is a reality. A young couple farewell each other as one heads on a oneway journey to Mars and the other stays behind on earth. This play questions how we value dreams, love and survival.

WORLD by Elspeth Tilley. 5w, 3m + 1 gender fluid and a chorus. A typical suburban supermarket becomes the target of protest action against the quantities of packaging on grocery items. The values and behaviours of the employees, new and old, management and team members, and of the protestors are all called into question as the community tries to find a way forward. A highly relevant play amidst changes to plastic bag usage practices in New Zealand supermarkets.
