



Message from the President

The 2020/2021 Year In Retrospect

Trying to assess the last Financial Year, is like trying to remember how the weather was.

Covid-19 all but obliterated theatre in our country, at all levels, for almost an entire year.

Primary and Secondary Schools, Tertiary Institutions, Community Theatre and Professional Theatre across the board, staggered from National Lockdown Level 4, to levels of varying degrees depending on where in the country you lived. There was no 'one size fits all', as outbreaks continued to fester around the country.

When we finally did emerge into summer, after the cancellation of TheatreFest for 2020 and holding our first ever Zoom Annual General Meeting, the Executive focused its efforts on our re-branded 2020+1 Celebrations.

We were determined to bring the membership, workshop tutors of the best practice we could garner and,

a National Hui to help address the rising concerns of inter-cultural inclusion and practice, gender and sexuality issues, being written about in new plays and presentations.

Some members of the Executive, who are accredited members of ANZDA also attended their workshop,

(February 2020) on gender identity and gender fluidity in casting.

Gone are the days when you could hear the sound of seats being slammed back, as the odd patron huffed and puffed their way up the aisles to the exits, because of a simple swear-word. Or the 'under-currents' of a play's subject matter!

The opportunity and forum that TheatreFest provides, is at last I feel, starting to feature home-grown stories of depth and complexity, not solely featuring playwrights works from outside of our country. The corollary effect of this forum has a flow-on effect into theatre and society across the board. But as next year's Annual Report will address, TheatreFest was not be be – again! At least we got Round One off the ground.

We find some groups are mounting their own 'Short New Plays or One-Act Festivals'. Admirable for Theatre in general. But, we do in-fact offer something that other organisations don't. The excellence of Adjudication, as you pass through the rounds. Wooing these groups into our festivals is ongoing.

TheatreFest is, at the heart of it, a teaching and learning experience for theatre practitioners, in all areas of creativity. This is its reason for existence.

And for those who do participate, we garner their excited energies, and they the rewards of participation.

Although our main event did not happen, we have not been idle.

Throughout last year, and into the beginning of this year, the National Executive have been addressing the ongoing issues of keeping our organisation active and 'relevant' in supporting our membership.

Guiding on OSH and theatre-practice safety concerns. Holding workshops and mentoring sessions. Refreshing our website.

Steering inquiries from the website on to the experienced practitioner, to address the many questions raised.

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I personally visited Buller/West Coast five times between the Lockdowns. Tutoring and helping to re-incentivise theatre practice, from Hokitika to Nelson. Also Timaru. Human contact – you can't beat it. And isn't that what theatre is about?

As with self-assessment of any kind, we must occasionally reflect on our own practices too. This year I intend to create task-forces, to look at our governance, strategies and operational processes.

The question I raise after fifty years of Theatre New Zealand's existence for the incoming Executive is: Is Theatre New Zealand fit for purpose, in the 2020 decade?

During the AGM special thanks were given to Ewen Coleman for his leadership organising our nationwide TheatreFest which this year attracted 52 entries from 15 societies and 12 schools. 48% scripts were NZ in origin and 35% of those were new scripts.

Patrons Jennifer Ward-Lealand and Rawiri Paratene were thanked for their support and will be asked to continue in this role.

At a National Executive meeting held the day before the AGM thanks were expressed to those stepping down. David Cox was thanked for his sterling job on the finances. Lorna Ashton was thanked for her solid contribution and Sam Lewis, our most youthful member was wished well for the acting career he aspires to.



Awards

The Olga E Harding Award for New New Zealand Playwriting adjudicated by Angie Farrow and sponsored by Playmarket was announced: the winner was Ellen Curnow who wrote The Denniston Rose for Onstage Productions of Westport, performed at their local TheatreFest. Ellen receives prize money, a certificate and the engraved trophy. There were 8 entries altogether this year and all received written feedback.

The David Brockett Memorial Award for outstanding contribution to backstage work over the past year was announced and the trophy was sent to Zane Doyle, who was nominated by SCDL for his work on their TheatreFest entry What Would Jesus Do? Zane had control of the audio effects but did so much more, using his initiative when other issues arose. He would seek solutions and quietly and seamlessly implement them. The nomination said that he is one of those crucial "invisible" behind-the-scenes people who are happy to make everyone else look their best while they maintain a low profile in the background.



New Awards

Sadly none of this year's new awards have seen the light of day:

- The Michael Norris Award for use of original and or live music;
- -The APRA Award for best use of soundscape and sound effects, including recorded music;
- <u>- The Steven Arnold Creativity Design Award</u> for costume and set design, visual appeal, soundscape, theatricality and ambience;
- He Pito Aronui Award: the Seeding of Creative Potential for a team using new writing, created by and containing Maori or Pacifika content featuring a culturally appropriate cast.

Remember about these awards next year and work on upskilling your production values to make a satisfying whole.



An entertaining one act comedy in which two strangers meet at a restaurant. The pair strike up a conversation and agree to have their meal together, culminating in a seductive duel and a tantalising twist.

Jess and Eliot are friends and colleagues working from home amidst a global pandemic. As far as they're concerned, nothing much has changed. Jess is eager to use the situation to her advantage, to climb the ranks and finally settle the score with an old workplace nemesis. Eliot is content nesting at home with his boyfriend and gossiping with his work wife on calls. On the surface, their new level 4 lives are bizarrely mundane, but trapped inside their home-turned-offices, the stresses of the new normal are threatening to burst their corporate bubbles wide open.

A woman relives an argument with an old friend, but is she remembering everything correctly?

Dan has done it all – Facebook, Bebo, Warcraft, that unfortunate foray on Tinder. Profiles, used and deleted. Now he's ready to reinvent himself. It's time for a new profile. However, there's a hitch. In order to forge a new identity, Dan has to face up to his internet history: the Bebo emo, Warcraft gamer, and Tinder casanova. They're cooler, savvier, and shot from more flattering angles. And they're not going down without a fight. Second Afterlife is a twisted allegory for the Facebook generation – a poetic, ass-kicking romp to the darkest corners of web. Commissioned by Young & Hungry Arts Trust.

The crew are catapulted into the future and have to figure out a way to reverse their journey so they can get back home.


Robin Hoodlum by Alex Lodge (2w, 3m, 20-100 any)

A play for a large ensemble of kids aged between 6 - 16. A post-modernised version of the Robin Hood story, dealing with how the rich and poor talk to each other in Aotearoa.

Kia ora Khalid by Dave Armstrong (2w, 2m, 20 any)

This children's opera takes place over a lunch hour in a New Zealand school, where we meet Tom, a pākehā boy, who has a bit of a mouth that he can't control, Trang, a first generation Cambodian New Zealander, Serena a Samoan migrant and ever the diplomat, and Khalid, an Afghani who arrived in New Zealand via the Nauru Island detention camp. Kia Ora Khalid explores these childrens' family stories, revealing that you don't have to go far back in any New Zealand family tree to find the refugee story in all of us.
