By Sunday afternoon, we understood Bryan's dictum "At the start of rehears al-10% character-90% self, on stage 90% character-10% self."

ITICKET OFFER

iTicket is offering streamlined pre-verification of event attendee's COVID-19 vaccination status using the government's new My Vaccine Pass.

They have secured an integration licence to provide secure pre-verification for events built into the ticketing process. Event promoters who wish to use pre-verification can make their onsite entry process faster and more streamlined where vaccine passes are required.

After purchasing tickets online through the iTICKET website, customers will then link to a new portal enabling them to officially pre-verify their MoH issued My Vaccine Pass for their ticket ahead of time, along with the ability to share other tickets to friends for them to do the same. By pre-verifying, this means attendees will only need a single scan of their ticket on arrival at the event.

iTICKET's pre-verification feature will be available for when the government confirms the decision to move the country to the new COVID-19 Protection Framework (Traffic Light system).

"Z JABS TO GET YOUR SPOT"

This catchy slogan is being used by Dannevirke Theatre Company to advertise the upcoming release of tickets for their production of The Addams Family next year.

Has your theatre management decided what you intend to do in this new normal to ensure the health and safety of cast and crew and audience attending performances? Theatre New Zealand is going to set some guidelines but in the mean time here are some principles that need consideration:

Containment of Covid-19 within the Theatre and wider communities.

Duty of care to casts, crews and audiences.

Staying in proactive communication.

Protection of vulnerable and susceptible people.

Legislative compliance.

Understand the Legal Requirements at each level of the Traffic Light system:

- Green level (some cases in the community, limited community transmission and manageable hospitalisations):
- + Record keeping and scanning will be required.
- + Face coverings will be mandatory in public venues.
- + Specified outdoor community events allowed with capacity limits.
- + There will be restrictions if vaccination certificates are used hospitality, gatherings and events (indoors and outdoors) will be able to open with up to 100 people, based on 1 metre distancing.
- + If a business, organisation or service does not request proof of vaccine, restrictions will apply or they will not be able to operate.
- Orange level (increasing community transmission putting pressure on the health system, increasing risk for at-risk people):
- + Record keeping and scanning will be required.
- + Face coverings will be mandatory in public venues.
- + There will be no limits if vaccination certificates are used for hospitality, gatherings and events (indoor and outdoor).
- + If a business, organisation or service does not request proof of vaccine, restrictions will apply (capacity limits and physical distancing) or they will not be able to operate.
- Red level (action needed to protect at-risk people and our health system from an unsustainable number of hospitalisations):
- + Record keeping and scanning will be required.
- + Face coverings will be mandatory in public venues.
- + Specified outdoor community events allowed with capacity limits.
- + There will be restrictions if vaccination certificates are used hospitality, gatherings and events (indoors and outdoors) will be able to open with up to 100 people, based on 1 metre distancing.
- + If a business, organisation or service does not request proof of vaccine, restrictions will apply or they will not be able to operate.

Understanding these levels helps you work out what each one means for your community. Consider auditions and crew recruitment, rehearsals and performances.



COPING IN THE TIME OF COVID - THE EXPERIENCES OF DARGAVILLE LITTLE THEATRE

Getting a show on the stage is difficult in these times. Dargaville Little Theatre has just finished their season of A Christmas Carol adapted from Charles Dickens by Eryn Wilson-Collins, Music and Lyrics by Julianne Parkinson and it was a roller coaster ride, to say the least.

Originally, the show was set to be staged in November 2020, but then Covid-19 appeared on our shores. We decided to push it out until 2022 and at the beginning of this year, it looked as though NZ had gained one over Covid -19 so we held auditions in July and had a massive turn out. Fully cast, we began our rehearsals in August. After having met with the cast in person only once, Delta arrived and we were plunged into Level 4 lockdown. It was here that we first tried out Zoom rehearsals. Although not ideal, we worked with the platform that we had and managed to maintain some momentum until the lockdown lifted and we were able to meet in person again.

What followed was a massive commitment from the cast and crew with extended rehearsals, extra hours on set, props and costumes to make up for lost time, only to be (once again) put back into lockdown. We were so close to being ready the consensus was to keep going - the show must go on! After more Zoom rehearsals, we were allowed back into the theatre four weeks before opening night, where we pulled off the momentous task to getting the show ready for opening night.

We were finally there - opening night was just days away. But then, a new challenge presented itself. Covid-19 decided to make an appearance in Dargaville. Places of interest, combined with cold-like symptoms in the cast, meant that some cast had to get a test and isolate, cancelling our first weekend of shows. A week, negative tests and fully recovered bodies later and we finally got to tread the boards with an audience! After experiencing so many challenges it was a relief to get to perform in front of someone!

We are extremely proud of the resilience that the cast and crew have shown during this roller coaster ride. It has shown us that with a bit of determination, thinking outside the box and constant re-working, we can adapt to challenging situations and still have a great outcome.

THEATRE NEW ZEALAND IS EXPANDING INTO THE BULLER/WEST COAST AREA!

It is with much pleasure and much excitement that I write about the revitalisation of TheatreFest in the Buller/West Coast Districts with the set up of Theatre NZ Buller/West Coast. Firstly, to put our task into perspective, the area we are working in extends from Karamea to Haast and inland to the Southern Alps which is approximately the same as the distance from Auckland to Wellington. Not a small challenge to bring all the communities together.

Some years ago, OnStage Productions (Westport) was an award-winning member of NZTF Canterbury/ West Coast before going into hiatus with the departure of their Artistic Director, who, incidentally, has now returned. Starting from small beginnings with meetings in Reefton and Westport, zoom meetings and many emails and then the mounting of a local Theatrefest this year at the NBS Theatre in Westport in August, it has become evident that this part of the country needs its own Theatre NZ area. With some sleuthing, investigating, and communicating, theatre groups suddenly find that they are not alone, and enthusiasm has begun to build.

After a couple of false starts due to the disastrous floods in Westport in July, seven plays were performed at a 2021 local TheatreFest in Westport with entries from Granity, Reefton, Westport, and Hokitika while a Greymouth production was adjudicated in their own town. The latter was due to the change of dates not being suitable for some of their cast's commitments. We aim to be all inclusive and when needed be flexible to members' needs.

There is now an entire area to begin to administer and invigorate. A steering committee is in place and funds have been granted by Creative Communities to run a course on Waitangi Weekend on Stanislavsky. Next year we will reach out to schools throughout the area and invite them into the programme and work with members to participate in TheatreFest 2022. Currently the steering committee consists of Westport members, however it is hoped to expand the executive to include at least one person from each town or group.

Acknowledgement must be made to Bryan Aitken for his many texts, emails and phone calls to wake our districts up to their potential. With Bryan just over the Alps, we will be using his vast knowledge for advice on administration and facilitating the wonderful classes he provides for new and experienced thespians.
