

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Tēnā tātou katoa

Is your Constitution fit for purpose?

As part of our future-proofing, template-making, cloud-storing, forward-thinking approach for 2022, The National Executive is also revisiting Theatre New Zealand's Constitution.

We recently had cause to seek legal clarification – and was told it was a mess!

Too open for 'interpretation' they said. So it's up for revision.

It is after-all over 50 years old, and a tweaked version at that, of the 1970 New Zealand Theatre Federation constitution. Some of its language is no longer appropriate for today. One clause, not even the Lawyer could understand!

So I'm urging you all to also revisit your group's constitution.

Because if you don't, and here is the real reason – your registration as an Incorporated Society, will lapse soon.

We have been advised by our constitutional lawyers that most groups, societies, charities

have constitutions that have out-lived their 'use-by-date'!

We must revise them and pass them before our memberships.

Then reapply for Incorporated Society status. This will not happen automatically.

There is no 'roll-over' system.

You may eventually receive individual advice of this – but here is your advance notice!

The Incorporated Societies Act of 1908 – is being replaced by the Incorporated Societies Act of 2022. About time you might say. You need to start re-registering by December 1st, 2025.

Get an action-group together soonest. Start the process. It may take a while to work through.

There are several other aspects of our operation that are also receiving attention.

Our TheatreFest site has been receiving bi-lingual headings, along with revising non-gender references and content. The Education System is charging ahead with inclusive language on all fronts, and we, Theatre New Zealand, have simply not kept up. Have you?

We are now heading into TheatreFest season at last.

What a year it looks like being..... Bumper registrations are being received.

Published plays, locally written or devised pieces are all eligible. We have a raft of new awards including He Pito Aronui-The Seeding of Creativity, especially founded for Māori and Pasifika works. Do we have your entries? You have until June17th to get them in.

The National Executive are hosting their first ever Cultural Hui. See details next issue, for the TheatreFest ShowCase weekend, September 17/18.



Rotorua Little Theatre's production in May was Waiting For God by Michael Aitkens


The SM reports that patrons really enjoyed the almost sold out production.

ENVIRONMENTAL PLAYS

The Bees at the End of the World by Amy Wright (3f, 1m) One Act

A family struggling on the edge of an unforgiving land must make a decision about how to survive. Gram wants to stay put. Jocelyn dreams of moving away. Honey counts the bees. The bees are dying. And the circle goes on.

Atlas/Mountains/Dead Butterfiles by Joseph Harper (2f, 2m, 2 any) One Act

This is a play about trying to find that slippery middle ground between being totally overwhelmed by the wealth of the world's problems, and being totally ignorant to their undeniable existence. The two protagonists slip, giddy, down either slope, pulled by various outside influences, crackpots, and their own developing sense of righteousness. Meanwhile Atlas presents and performs a parable about millions of dead butterflies being brought to life and holding the world afloat.

The Night Mechanics by Mīria George (2f, 2m, 1 any) One Act

A small drought stricken Māori community in the middle of Aotearoa becomes the flash point of resistance against 'the water company' a multi-national that is more powerful than the government. Inspired by the modern fight for clean water, The Night Mechanics is a tale where water is no longer free and where dreams no longer exist. Is this the future?

LAUGH-OUT-LOUD COMEDIES

Jack the Stripper by Lindsey Brown (2f, 1m) One Act

When your part time job is a little risque, it's only natural to want to keep it under wraps. But what happens when your mother finds out and you're forced to lay the truth bare?

The Little Black Dress by Allen O'Leary (6f, 1m) Full Length

A contemporary Hampstead drawing room comedy using the idea of a charity clothes swap event.

The Biggest by Jamie McCaskill (1f, 5m) Full Length

It's been a while since Poppa, Pat and Mick have seen Stu. He's been absent from the local working men's club since Stu wrote off the new boat he spent his life savings on and landed himself in a wheelchair. Reunited, the men seize the opportunity to enter the local fishing competition to win Stu a replacement boat. All they have to do is catch the biggest fish...

This hilarious comedy takes a look at a group of old friends--and a couple of new enemies--navigating life in small-town Aotearoa.

Blind Eye by April Phillips (2f, 2m) Full Length

Wally and Vera are a salt of the earth couple in their golden years. They have lived on the same street their entire lives. They have kept to themselves and led decent lives. Or have they?

A malicious attack on the old man results in two strangers entering their lives. Strangers who gradually unravel a long-held and shameful secret with devastating consequences. What the strangers discover will disorient their own moral compasses and question the clarity of right and wrong.

Handy Man by Gavin McGibbon

(1f, 2m) Full Length

We join Richard and Claire at their remote 'super-bach' as they divide up their possessions in preparation for their divorce. Things are already fraught, and then the toilet breaks – they need a plumber. Enter Dom and in no time he has it fixed. With his purpose served this urban couple can't wait to see the back of this unusual tradesman but Dom has other ideas – he's been waiting for tonight for a long time...a leaky toilet, a remote bach and a captive audience.

For just one night Dom wants to be heard, to close the gap between rich and poor, but Richard and Claire hide a dark secret, that will change Dom's life forever.

Drawer of Knives by Stephen Sinclair

(2f, 1m) Full Length

When Sarah and her infant son move into the flat below Denise and Russell, the rot sets in. Reality blurs with alternative relationships conducted in imagination; the characters are locked in the hell of the present where nothing is as it seems.

Beast by Tom Sainsbury (3-6f, 4-10m) Full Length

A road trip turns into a nightmare when three siblings break down in Kaitangata. The locals are strange. The food is stranger. A thriller horror.

Con by Gavin McGibbon (1f, 3m) Full Length

In a world of pyramid schemes, dodgy builders and Nigerian internet scams, the con artist is the fastest growing career path of the 21st century.

Stevie and Earl are conmen, they're good at it too, they get people to do what they shouldn't. And now here's their chance to make money like never before. They have been waiting for it for years, all the tricks and their schemes have built to it. A con so wicked it's totally irresistible.

Will they pull it off and what will be the consequences when love walks in the door?
