But we frequently need to address the question: have I been allowing others in!

Has my presence in fact inhibited others from coming forward.

Do I need to shoulder-tap new people specifically?

Have I aided a transition and, supported the succession plans of my group?

Am I in-fact getting in the way of progress and fresh ideas?

I am asking myself, will my legacy be of Mākohakoha, Teacher and Mentor – or am I stultifying progress, because I am feeding my own needs!

#### Rāwiri Paratene CNZM

(Ngāpuhi) is a renowned actor, director and writer appearing on stage, television and film.

The New Zealand Festival commissioned Paratene and Murray Lynch to write a play called Blue Smoke that premiered in 2000. It is set in the 1950s and is a musical featuring music from the era. The title of the play is also the title of a famous song Blue Smoke, which was the first record wholly produced in New Zealand and became a hit in the United States. He has worked for most of New Zealand's professional Theatre Companies. In 2014, Paratene joined the cast of the London Globe Theatre's two-year world tour of Hamlet, visiting 205 countries. He was the only non-British based actor in the cast. Rāwiri shot to international prominence in the Film Whale Rider. Rawiri is also a Patron of Theatre New Zealand..



### **Murray Lynch ONZM**

Murray began his career at Four Seasons Theatre in Whanganui in 1973. He has worked as Artistic Director of Centrepoint Theatre, Associate Director at Theatre Corporate, Artistic Director of the Maidment Arts Centre, founding director of Tantrum Theatre Company and Associate Director at Downstage Theatre.

Murray headed the Acting and Directing Programmes at Toi Whakaari: NZ Drama School until his appointment as Director of Downstage in 2000, a position he held for six years. In 2007 he graduated with a Masters in Theatre with distinction from Victoria University. He was appointed director of Playmarket in January 2010.



#### Amanda Hereaka (Ngāti Tūwharetoa, Te Arawa)

brings a wealth of knowledge and expertise after 20 years in the industry working in almost every role imaginable; from theatre usher to Artistic Director and Board member. She has worked for numerous organisations including Capital E, Taki Rua Productions, Circa Theatre and City Gallery as well as the Wellington International Jazz Festival, Fringe NZ, Laugh, ERUPT Festival and co-established with Native Earth (Canada) and Yirra Yaakin (Australia) the International Indigenous Theatre Festival, Honouring Theatre.

She has produced the popular Waitangi Day concert Kotahi, as well as outdoor film screenings, Peninsula Pictures, at Kahurangi School in Strathmore Park. Prior to joining Creative New Zealand, Amanda was a Funding Advisor at Wellington City Council.



#### Mishelle Muagututi'a

started her theatre career after attending PUAWAI performing arts school in the early 1990s as a contemporary dance student. Mishelle joined the HORIZON cast as an actor, the first Pacific theatre story to be produced out of Christchurch, completing a tour of Aotearoa. This experience for the cast and writer planted the seed for a new performing arts company, Pacific Underground, in 1992. Pacific Underground is the longest-running Pacific performing arts company in Aotearoa today. As an Archivist currently managing a busy specialist audiovisual preservation team Mishelle is also interested in social history, art initiatives, gardening and audio-visual technology.

Barry was a dentist, Gen was a lawyer. Now they are both in their seventies and retired. Retirement has gone swimmingly so far with the usual international cruises, yoga classes, attendance at funerals, dealing with body corporate issues and the occasional fall. But when Barry is diagnosed with leukemia the two need to deal with the prospect of death. A witty two-hander that captures the essence of married life in retirement in contemporary times. ### Editor, signing off

The time has come for me to retire from writing and assembling Backchat. I've been doing it off and on for over 20 years and it has been a pleasure to be touch with so many of you. Thank you for responding to my requests for photos and information. Backchat, as the name suggests is a gathering together of theatre snippets and more recently I've followed you on Facebook and your websites (if the posts are up to date!) and have been able to share your news with other members. An editor needs your input!

One of the two pages of Backchat I think most important and the one that takes the most time to assemble, is the What's On or On the Boards listing as it's now called. If you read that someone else has taken the time and trouble to mount a specific play then maybe it's worth looking at for your own group. The other important page comes to me ready to go, the Playmarket listing. Choose the right catalyst (play) and your whole group and your audience will have an enriching experience.
